## Fall Foliage Shade Trees



An excellent street and parking lot tree species as it does not become too wide. It has better fall color than the red maple cultivar 'Armstrong'. During the summer months the leaves are dark green above and grayish beneath. In the fall, the leaves turn shades of yellow, orange and reddish orange, before being shed for the winter.

This is a fine tree for the urban landscape as it has a high tolerance for wind, pollution, drought and compacted soils.

## Spring Flowering Trees




A slow growing, medium-sized tree with a broad rounded crown. It makes a fantastic compact shade tree, with smooth gray (almost beech-like) bark and bright green leaves that turn yellow-orange-gold in fall. Yellowwood is also prized for its early summer display of white, wisteria-like flower panicles that are borne heavily in alternating years or every third year. The tree gets its name from the bright yellow color of freshly cut heartwood.

Noted for its rounded shape, white flowers, large red fruit and excellent disease resistance. Bright oval green leaves (to 3" long). Pink buds open in spring to white flowers (1.5" diameter). Flowers are followed by large, bright red crabapples (to $1.5^{\prime \prime}$ diameter) that mature in fall and may persist into winter. Birds are attracted to the fruit. Fruit is sometimes harvested for jellies. This cultivar is considered to be a good selection for gardens in the southeast.

An outstanding flowering tree with an upright form that becomes rounded with age. Reddish new foliage matures to a dark green. This easy-to-grow accent tree can be used as a single specimen in the front yard for curb appeal, or in the back where you may enjoy its seasonal changes. An excellent habitat and food source for wildlife.

Red buds open to violet-red flowers (1.5" diameter). Flowers are followed by bright red crabapples (to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ diameter) that mature in fall and may persist into winter. Birds are attracted to the fruit. Fruit may be harvested for jellies.

Robinson Crabapple
Malus x 'Robinson'

A pink-flowered crabapple noted for its rounded shape, deep pink flowers, red fruit and good disease resistance. Oval leaves (to $3^{\prime \prime}$ long) emerge purple when young, turn bronze green with red veining during the growing season and finally turn varying orange fall color. Crimson buds open in spring to deep pink flowers (1.5" diameter). Flowers are followed by bright red crabapples (to $3 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ diameter) that mature in fall and may persist into winter. Birds are attracted to the fruit. Fruit may be harvested for jellies.

A disease resistant crabapple with crisp green foliage. Lovely pale pink buds open to showy white flowers that completely blanket its upright habit. The flowers are some of the most fragrant among all crabapples. Red fruit persists through winter. The foliage color is a golden red in the fall.

A small, deciduous tree with serrated leaves; they are often bronzetoned when newly emerged, becoming dark green by summer. The flowers emerge before the leaves in early spring; they are fragrant, 1 $1.5^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter, with five white or pale pink petals. The flowers grow in clusters of five or six together. Introduced to Europe and North America in 1902. The National Cherry Blossom Festival is a spring celebration in Washington, D.C., commemorating the 1912 gift of Japanese cherry trees from Tokyo to the city of Washington.

## D.D. Blanchard Magnolia



This is a large, fast-growing, deciduous, pyramidal tree with attractive, feathery foliage. Foliage is russet-brown in autumn. It has spreading branches that droop with age. was discovered during a plant expedition into remote China in the 1940s. It was first known from a fossil record, not living extant plants.
